COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course provides the students with the basic language, frameworks, and analytic tools that form the foundation of the economic thought. Students will learn how to explain events and concepts through graphs, charts, and tables and will learn how to interpret the information that these representations can provide. Economics, as a topic, will expose students to applying quantitative analytic techniques to social science issues. Students will learn to the analyze mechanisms of markets, the structures of firms, and roles of the government. Economics provides students life concepts and skills that are basic tools to being a good citizen, a wise consumer, and an effective worker. In Microeconomics students will learn how utility analysis can allow decisions to rationally consider subjective elements, how marginal analysis can lead to optimization, and how following implication chains of cause and effect can help one to predict consequences.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Students will be able to:

- Use marginal analysis for decision making
- Describe the flow of resources through households and firms
- Analyze the supply and demand of any product market, employing a detailed model of both supply and demand
- Analyze the supply and demand of any resource market, employing a detailed model of both supply and demand
- Explain the behavior of firms based on the nature of their product markets, cost structure, and resource markets
- Discuss the motivation of government in influencing product markets and portray the impact of their actions
- Show the impact of trade on individual product markets.
